Welcome to the new Special Youth Services newsletter!



Hope Bags

We had many wonderful ministries and individuals reach out to us to make Hope Bags, write letters, and donate snacks for our youth. Thank you to: the O'Driscoll family, St. Edward's Youth Ministry, Prince of Peace Spanish Faith Formation program, Notre Dame Young Adult Ministry, St. Christopher's Youth Group, Nhóm Ca Nguyên at Christ the Incarnate Word, Rice University Catholic Student Center, and friends at St. Dominic Chancery. Read below about the experience of the O'Driscoll's putting together Hope Bags as a family and with the youth at St. Edward's.

"I must admit that it was my wife's idea.

We have always discussed finding more ways to instill a sense of service in our children, but she is the one who would plan for us to volunteer at the food pantry or sort donations for the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

As they have grown (they are now in middle school), we have been searching for ways to make the service we offer more relatable to them. When my wife told me about the Hope Bags project from Special Youth Services, I was excited about participating but nervous about whether it would be too much for our children. Would they want to hear about young people their own age in juvenile detention? We do not try to shelter our kids from the realities of the world, but I wondered how they would respond to a discussion on this topic.

Thankfully, and partially to my surprise, their responses were full of compassion and sympathy. They dove into the project with enthusiasm, decorating bags with colorful expressions of hope and prayers. They asked questions about what the young people who would be receiving them, what would go inside the bags, and why someone their own age might end up in a juvenile detention facility.

Over the summer, we decided to share the Hope Bag project with more junior high students at our church. The parish was offering a junior high summer series on Sunday evenings. It was a diverse group of teens, but we were hopeful.

It was an amazing night! As we discussed many of the same questions that my own children had asked, we saw their minds come to an awareness of how their actions would affect their peers. They reflected on the idea of not being able to go home and sleep in their own beds, or to see their family and friends. They talked about the concepts of redemption and forgiveness. They prayed for those who would receive the bags.

Through such a simple task, just some markers and a paper bag, we saw these young people become aware of people their own age who were in need. More importantly, they learned that they were not limited by their age when it comes to making a difference. They can bring hope to others. They can be hope in our world today."



For the first time in a few years, Special Youth Services was able to hold Saintly Saturday live and in person for the youth in one of our facilities. Everyone that was involved and participated spent the day soaking up God's graces through prayer, sharing, singing, activities, sharing meals, fellowship, and joyful celebration.

The event began with a lot of excitement when a live band led everyone in songs of worship and entertainment. All participated in moving to the music and setting a cheerful tone to the day. In our first visit back to KLA after Saintly Saturday, the music was the most mentioned activity that everyone seemed to enjoy.

Also known as the rapper "Big Cease", Cesar connected to several of the residents with two of his faith-based rap music videos. Through the day, many of the young men sought out Cesar to talk with him individually.

During lunch, each of the four units utilized their teamwork to create a themed poster demonstrating how to transform from sinner to saint. All of the posters showed their tremendous talents in illustrating the conversion from a life of sin to a life that is Christ-centered. The poster chosen to be the best example was rewarded with a special treat.



A Volunteer's Perspective

About six years ago, the Archdiocese was handing out social ministry assignments to deacon candidates. I dreaded the idea that they might put me into prison ministry. The thought made me terribly uncomfortable, and that scared me even more, because God tends to send me places where I don't want to go. Sure enough, my assignment was to work with Special Youth Services to serve those in the juvenile justice system. Praise God for how He pushes me to where I do not want to be.

I was assigned to Gulf Coast Trades Center (GCTC), a facility in New Waverly that focuses on educating high school aged boys in trades like automotive repair, carpentry, bricklaying, or culinary arts. With the skills they learn, they are capable of finding worthwhile careers and growing quickly into independent adults.

All of that sounds lovely on paper, but I had no idea how to handle this assignment. I drove out each week to lead a Bible study with a small group of guys. It started with two and grew slowly to groups of up to 12. I hope they didn't see it, but every time I

made the drive, I was nervous and wondering how in the world I was going to teach them anything. The meetings went fine, but I'll admit that it was hard for me.

Probably what shook me out of my discomfort was a prayer from one of the boys. At the end of each Bible study, I would close by leading a prayer. One time, a participant asked if he could pray after me. When I agreed, he offered a beautiful thanksgiving. What absolutely made me melt was his opening: "Thank you, God, for sending these people here to acknowledge us." He didn't thank our Father for sending people to teach them or to have fun with them. This young man thanked God for the very simple fact of acknowledging their existence. I learned such a lesson from his prayer. My success in this role wasn't anything I did at the Bible study. There wasn't any need for eloquent Scriptural speeches. I didn't need to impress them. Instead, what I needed to do was to simply show up. My drive, my preparation, my work with them was all a reminder that they are loved

by others and that our love for them represented the love of God.

That moment of prayer was one of my most impactful SYS moments, but no experience has been more fun than our recent "Bible Bowl." The SYS staff joined us to host an on-site game show - complete with buzzers! Several of the residents joined the competition, creating four teams that vied to win the grand prize: a hot Burger King dinner! As each question was displayed, the players clicked a buzzer. The first one to answer would shout out the answer. Right or wrong, there was excitement and laughter with every response. For me, it was a joy to witness all the fun. The most enjoyable moments were witnessing the interaction of the young men. The players rejoiced when they gave right answers to tough questions. When one of the less confident guys got an answer correct, everyone would cheer like he had scored a touchdown. Sometimes, I was worried that their jumping and fist-pumping celebrations might be too much, but after each round concluded, the teams happily shook hands and congratulated each other. Every report from the guys since that day has been to share how much fun they had and to ask when it would happen again. Even though their regular facility dinner concluded shortly before the Burger King arrived, the winning team was thrilled to have the bonus food. They gulped it down victoriously.

Somehow, six years at GCTC have flown by. Franchelle, Alejandra, Deacon Dan, Deacon Fernando, and now Sister Symphonie have all put up with me and my silly sense of humor. In a world where many businesses are inefficient, top-heavy organizations, SYS is a small but mighty team that has served thousands effectively. The love of God is obvious in what the staff does and what they offer of themselves. All of us volunteers carry that same love to the youth who need so desperately to have some awareness of their value in the eyes of their Heavenly Father. Many thanks to all of you who serve along with me!

In June 2023, Special Youth Services said goodbye to Deacon Fernando. We celebrated his five years (plus two as volunteer) with us with a chancery get-together, snacking on pan dulce and horchata. Many friends stopped by to share their warm wishes for Deacon as he transitions into his new position as the director of Admissions and Scrutiny of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate. Just as we consider him a forever part of the SYS family, he also does not forget about us! The following is an article he wrote for the Texas Catholic Herald on August 15, 2023:

Every day, in Harris County alone, several hundred youths ages 10 to 17 reside in juvenile detention centers. Lost in despair and hopelessness, these youth turn to

volunteers of Special Youth Services (SYS) who offer an encouraging word, inspiring Scripture and comforting prayer to see them through their difficulties. Coming from all walks of life, laypersons, religious, and clergy, all work in the vineyard together, serving some of the most vulnerable youth.

And whether it's offering weekly Bible studies or pastoral visits, it is the Holy Spirit continuously at work in the hearts of the youth, and just as equally in the hearts of the volunteers, no matter how experienced or seasoned they are, myself included.

During my diaconate formation years, I, along with several other candidates for the diaconate, entered the vineyard as SYS volunteers.

Assigned as our social ministry, it was our opportunity to practice what we learned through formation, where the "rubber meets the road," as some would say. For me, that road would eventually lead me to work as a pastoral minister for SYS.

However, whether as a volunteer or pastoral minister, I saw what they meant in the diaconate program that we are never done being formed.

I recall one day in particular that seemed like so many others spent in the facilities, filled with God's teachings through individual prayer, pastoral listening and a lot of catechesis. As the conversation with one young man was winding down, he asked about my plans for the evening. I said I was attending the vigil for my friend's mother, who passed away. We finished our conversation and concluded with prayer, lifting up his petitions to God. As we stood up and shook hands, he said in a solemn voice, "I'm sorry about your friend, sir."

Here I stood before a young man who was at a loss. Without his freedom, his family, friends and home. Having lost so much in the middle of his chaos, he stood there comforting me! The rubber had met the road as my years of learning were tested, and I was found wanting.

How often had I allowed my own chaos to blind me from the pain and suffering of others, diminishing the gravity of their situation based on my own situation? Humbled by the young man's empathy for me while still dealing with his situation, it was I who had been taught the lesson — a lesson that is still not forgotten.

Recently I returned to the diaconate formation program; however, now in the role of director of Admissions and Scrutiny for the Office of the Permanent Diaconate.

While I still found opportunities to stay connected and serve SYS, I have a greater understanding and appreciation for the value of social ministries assigned to the candidates to the diaconate.

Whether its visiting detention centers, prisons, hospitals or other facilities, social ministries like SYS continue to offer candidates to the diaconate an opportunity to practice what they've learned, but more importantly, they offer continuous learning opportunities for them, helping in the formation process and refining the skills of the potential deacon.

January 24th, 2022, was my first day with Special Youth Services. When people knew that I visited the youth in the detention centers, they often asked me why I chose to minister there. To the SYS core team - Thank you for welcoming me to the team. I am grateful for your support and encouragement during my time with you. Thank you for entrusting me to extend the mission of Special Youth Services to our youth.

My Congregation asked me to return to the Motherhouse and to learn to be a formator for the new discerners. To do that, I just finished a month of training as a spiritual director at the Ignatius Retreat Center in Guelph, Canada. I am now preparing to go to Rome for a Formator Program. While I am excited about my new role, moving on was a tough decision. SYS is an exceptional ministry, and I am grateful for the opportunity to serve with you all.




Linda was the founder and executive director of Youth SOULutions, providing life skills, aftercare, mentoring, and community service opportunities for youth and families of Harris, Ventura





Una conversación entre el diácono Fernando y un hermanito en Cristo, J.D.

Diácono Fernando: ¿Cuánto tiempo tienes aquí en Gulf Coast Trades Center?

J.D.: Cinco meses.

DF: Cómo era tu relación con Dios antes de venir a la instalación?

J.D.: Apenas empezando. Es el comienzo de una nueva historia con Dios.

DF: ¿Cómo es ahora?

J.D.: He llegado muy lejos. Un trabajo en desarrollo. Trabajando en mí mismo. Dios me contesta. Bendición tras bendición. He llegado lejos.

DF: ¿Cómo te ha ayudado SYS (el estudio bíblico con el diácono Mike) con tu relación con/conocimiento de Dios?

J.D.: Las lecturas. Siento cada vez que tengo un problema en la semana, la lectura va a hablar sobre eso. Como las lecturas de la semana pasada, humildad, y yo tenía problemas con mi temperamento.

DF: ¿Por qué vas al estudio bíblico cada semana?

J.D.: Para mantenerme más cerca a Dios. Y para aprender más sobre mí mismo.

DF: ¿Puedes explicar lo que es Bible Bowl?

J.D.: Era una competencia que te mantiene alerta. Se trata de conocer a Dios e invitar a otros a conocerlo. La próxima semana tuvimos una semana más grande [en el Estudio bíblico].

DF: Dinos sobre tu experiencia ese día.

J.D.: Sentía que estaba en las manos de Dios. No me sabía algunas preguntas pero el instinto me hizo lanzarme y lo hice bien. Tenía dudas sobre competir debido a los demás, pero tenía ganas de ver cómo les salía y cómo aprendían.

DF: ¿Cómo te sentiste cuando ganó tu equipo?

J.D.: Me sentí bien conmigo mismo. Más cerca a Dios. Como: "Soy hijo de Dios."

DF: ¿Qué mensaje tienes para jóvenes para invitarlos a tener una relación con Dios?

J.D: Pregúntales: "Qué está pasando en tu vida?" La biblia la tiene.

DF: ¿Qué mensaje tienes para jóvenes que están tomando el camino equivocado?

J.D.: Encuentren una mejor manera. La manera equivocada es un camino feo y oscuro, como estar perdido en el bosque mirando alrededor. No sabes adónde vas, estás atorado.

DF: ¿Qué mensaje tienes para los padres de familia?

J.D.: Traten de acercarse a sus hijos. No traten de empujarlos al camino correcto. Hablen con ellos y dales un empujoncito suave.

DF: Hay algo más que te gustaría decirles a nuestros lectores?

J.D.: Expíate. De la lectura de hoy: Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29.



La perspectiva de un voluntario

Diácono Mike Krall-Gulf Coast Trades Center

Hace unos seis años, la Arquidiócesis estaba distribuyendo asignaciones de ministerio a los candidatos diaconales. Temía a la idea de que me podrían poner en el ministerio de prisión. La idea me hacía terriblemente incómodo, y eso me asustaba más, porque Dios suele mandarme a lugares a donde no quiero ir. Efectivamente, mi asignación era trabajar con Special Youth Services para servir a los que están en el sistema de justicia juvenil. Alabado sea Dios por como me empuja hacia donde no quiero estar.

Estaba asignado a Gulf Coast Trades Center (GCTC), una institución en New Waverly que se enfoca en la educación de niños en edad de preparatoria en oficios como reparación de automóviles, carpintería, albañilería o arte culinaria. Con las habilidades que aprenden, son capaces de encontrar carrereas que valgan la pena y convertirse rápidamente en adultos independientes.

Todo eso suena bonito en papel, pero yo no tenía idea de cómo manejar esta tarea. Iba cada semana para dirigir un estudio bíblico con un grupo pequeño de muchachos. Empezó con dos y lentamente creció a

grupos de hasta 12. Espero que no lo hayan visto, pero cada vez que hacía el viaje, estaba nervioso y me preguntaba cómo iba a enseñarles algo. Las juntas iban bien, pero admito que era difícil para mí.

Probablemente lo que me sacó de mi incomodidad fue una oración de uno de los chicos. Al final de cada estudio bíblico, yo cerraba dirigiendo una oración. Una vez, un participante me preguntó si podía orar después de mí. Cuando acepté, ofreció un hermoso agradecimiento. Lo que absolutamente me derritió fue cómo empezó: "Gracias, Dios, por mandarnos a esta gente a reconocernos." Él no le dio gracias a nuestro Padre por enviar a gente a enseñarles o divertirse con ellos. Este joven le dio gracias a Dios por el simple hecho de reconocer su existencia. Aprendí tal lección de su oración. Mi éxito en este papel no era nada que hice en el estudio bíblico. No había necesidad de discursos bíblicos elocuentes. No necesitaba impresionarlos. En cambio, lo necesitaba hacer era simplemente estar presente. Mi motivación, mi preparación, mi trabajo con ellos era todo un recordatorio que son amados por otros y que nuestro amor por ellos representa el amor de Dios.

Ese momento de oración era uno de los momentos más impactantes en SYS para mí, pero ninguna experiencia ha sido más divertido que nuestro reciente "Bible Bowl." El personal de SYS se unió a nosotros para presentar un programa de juegos en el sitio, ¡completo con timbres! Varios de los residentes participaron en la competencia, creando cuatro equipos que compitieron para ganar el gran premio: ¡una cena caliente de Burger King! Mientras se mostraba cada pregunta, los jugadores hacían clic en un timbre. El primero en contestar gritaba la respuesta correcta. Correcto o no, había emoción y risa con cada respuesta. Para mí, era un gozo ser testigo de toda la diversión. Los momentos más agradables era ver las interacciones de los jóvenes. Los jugadores regocijaron cuando daban respuestas correctas a preguntas difíciles. Cuando uno de los chicos con menos confianza pregunta correctamente, respondía a una vitoreaban como si hubiera anotado un touchdown. A veces me preocupaba que podrían ser demasiado sus celebraciones de saltos y gestos de victoria con el puño, pero después que terminaba cada ronda, los equipos felizmente se daban la mano y se felicitaban. Cada reporte de los chicos desde ese día ha sido para compartir qué tanto se divirtieron y para preguntar cuándo iba a suceder de nuevo. A pesar que su cena regular de la instalación concluyó poco antes de que llegara la comida de Burger King, el equipo ganador estaba entusiasmado de tener la comida adicional. Se la comieron victoriosamente.

De alguna manera, seis años en GCTC se han pasado volando. Franchelle, Alejandra, el diácono Dan, el diácono Fernando y ahora la hermana Symphonie me han aguantado a mí y a mi tonto sentido de humor. En un mundo donde muchas empresas son organizaciones ineficientes y sobrecargadas, SYS es un equipo pequeño pero poderoso que ha servido a miles de manera efectiva. El amor de Dios es evidente en lo que hace el personal y en lo que ofrecen de sí mismos. Todo los voluntarios llevamos ese mismo amor a los jóvenes que tan desesperadamente necesitan tener alguna conciencia de su valor a los ojos de su Padre celestial. ¡Muchas gracias a todos ustedes que sirven junto a mí!



The Woman who Always Prays

"Rose Philippine Duchesne came to the wilds of North America when anything west of Pittsburgh was considered uncharted wilderness. She came up the Mississippi to Missouri and established a school at St. Charles as early as 1818, while St. Elizabeth Seton was doing her work in the eastern United States. She is the foundress of the American branch of the Society of the Sacred Heart.

She was born in Grenoble, France, in 1769, her father a successful businessman. She was educated by the Visitation nuns and, although her father opposed her decision,

she entered the Visitation Order in 1788, in the middle of the French Revolution. She was not able to make her profession because of the disruption of the Revolution and had to return home when the Visitation sisters were expelled from their convents.

During the Revolution, she cared for the sick and poor, helped fugitive priests, visited prisons, and taught children. After the Revolution, she tried to reorganize the Visitation community but was unsuccessful, so she offered the empty convent to St. Madeleine Sophie Barat, foundress of the Society of the Sacred Heart, and entered the Sacred Heart Order herself. When the bishop of New Orleans, William Du Bourg, requested nuns for his huge Louisiana diocese, St. Rose Philippine Duchesne came to the United States, arriving in New Orleans in 1818.

She and her four nuns were sent to St. Charles, Missouri, where she immediately opened a school; then at Florissant, she built a convent, an orphanage, a parish school, a school for Indians, a boarding academy, and a novitiate for her order. In 1827, she was in St. Louis where she founded an orphanage, a convent, and a parish school. Her energy and ideas were prodigious. When she was seventy-two years old, she founded a mission school for Indian girls in Kansas and spent much of her time there nursing the sick.

Her last years were spent at St. Charles, a model and inspiration to those around her, facing all the hardships of pioneer work. She died on November 18, 1852, at the age of eighty-three and was canonized in 1988. She was truly the 'missionary of the American frontier,' one that her beloved Potawatomi Indians called <Quah-kah-ka-num-ad>, 'Woman-who-prays-always.' Her Feast Day is November 18. Her patronage is perseverance amid adversity."
