

What is a Small Christian Community?

"Small communities are a means for Christians to live the mission more fully through communion with other Christians. Support for the value of small communities is found in three principles:

- 1. the communitarian nature of the church
- 2. renewed focus on the Word of God
- 3. greater understanding of the social mission of the church."

Questions for Faith Sharing


- ► How have I felt God call me to some form of pastoral ministry or social action?

Elements of Storytelling

There is value and power in telling our stories and listening to others to interpret the meaning in our lives. Some elements include:

- 1. the Gospels are narratives actual stories of Jesus
- 2. when we share our story, we are telling how God is acting in our lives it is often in the telling itself, that we experience the Spirit's presence
- 3. as we hear others talk about their lives, we realize how God is present and active in their lives
- 4. not only do we hear the narrative of Jesus' life but we start to apply the Word to our own lives
- 5. as we listen to one another we have a sense of the Spirit acting in the community

- ▶ 2. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of the joy of evangelization! (#83)

- ▶ 4. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of community! (#92)
- ▶ 5. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of the Gospel! (#97)
- 6. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of the ideal of fraternal love! (#101)
- ➤ 7. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of missionary vigor! (#109)

Seven Lessons - Role of Planning


- 1. Refocus all ministries on the kingdom of God
- 2. Simplify and personalize the message these ministries proclaim
- 3. Build community and hospitality into all ministries
- 4. Serve with pride, zeal and enthusiasm
- 5. Emphasize the basics of the faith
- 6. Put a high priority on lay leadership
- 7. Foster a deep love for Scripture

A Meditation for Sowers

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view. The Kingdom of God is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work.

Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection, no pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the Church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything.



This is what we are about: We plant seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and do it very well.

It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker.

We are the workers, not master builders, ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future that is not our own.
